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Living with a Loss After Five Years or More

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Nearly six years have passed since the stillbirth of Byron and my second son, Jonathan Daniel. After his death I was repeatedly reminded by well-meaning people of the adage, "time heals all wounds", which is true in part, but we must realize that no amount of time makes the sorrow completely go away. As mothers we never get over our loss; we learn to move forward and go on with our new life, but the heartache never entirely diminishes. The memories that were once so incredibly painful eventually become bittersweet and allow us to remember our babies without feeling as if our heart is breaking once again.

Despite the years that have gone by, I can still cite the date of every milestone during my pregnancy with him. Filed away in my bedroom is my 1995 calendar which contains records of all my doctor appointments and hospital stays. There is a number above every Thursday denoting a new week of gestation, along with a huge square around September 7, which was my due date. I remember the day my pregnancy was confirmed, the week the sonogram revealed my baby was a boy, how far along I was when my doctor put me on bedrest and the morning I was hospitalized. However, no date is as vivid to me as June 24, 1995, which is the day my little Jonathan went to be with Jesus. I can recount every minute detail from the moment I woke up that morning until the afternoon his perfectly formed body was placed in the ground five days later. No matter how many years pass, I will always remember.

As I reflect over the past 5 1/2 years sometimes I have to convince myself that it really happened. As I reminisce my pregnancy and Jonathan's death, followed by the months of grieving, I cannot believe I actually survived it all. The hours I spent searching for the answers to my "why" questions, the sleepless nights, the feelings of isolation and desperation are not pleasant memories, yet now I see so many good things that have resulted from my loss. Obviously I would do anything to have Jonathan back, but I now know that his death was not in vain but has meaning. I often tell our support group members that we have two choices following a baby's death. We can either become hard, resentful people or we can eventually get to the point of saying, "Okay Lord, you allowed this to happen for a purpose. Show me what to do with it." It is up to us as parents to make our babies' lives, through their deaths, count for something. What kind of legacy would we give them if we remained bitter and angry for the rest of our lives?

We chose to focus this issue on losses that occurred 5 years ago or more because some believe after a certain amount of time we as parents should have picked up the pieces of our lives and in a way forgotten the tragedy that occurred so many years ago. I want to assure all of us who have now endured several anniversaries of our children's deaths, many holidays wondering, "what if...," calculating what grade in school they would be in, and imagining who their friends would have been that it's okay to still hurt and it's normal to still cry at times. I further charge you to make something positive out of your loss. Seek a support group where you can volunteer your time to reach out to fellow grieving parents or visit the guestbook on our website on a regular basis and write to the ones whose losses were recent and so desperately need comfort. Finally, thank the Lord that through your suffering you have gained perseverance, character, and hope (Romans 5:3-4).

Your little voice spoke, so happy with a smile,


"Hello Daddy, I can only stay for a while. I came to say

I wanted to roll in the floor with him and tickle his little toes and I wanted to pinch his cheeks and pull his nose. I didn't want to wonder what he would like, or who he would be.

I keep thinking, "He would be five today." I miss my little boy. I miss him for the precious baby he was and for the boy that might have been. I miss him for the memories I have and for the dreams that could have been. I miss the firsts in his life. His first step, his first word. I miss launching him into life...toddlerhood, kindergarten, adolescence, and graduation. I wanted to see who he would be.

I keep thinking, "He would be five today." I cannot believe the years have passed. I cannot believe our family has survived without him. But I know we really haven't. He has always been here. He will always be here. He is a part of our lives. We hold him in our hearts...and yet...I still wonder who he would be.

In some ways it is hard to believe that it has been five and a half years since we lost our precious daughter Sarah. But most of the time it seems like a lifetime ago...

I still think about Sarah almost every day, and there are tangible reminders of her scattered through our lives. We talk about her and visit the cemetery occasionally. But time has made it so much easier. Although I do not understand why God chose Sarah, I am at peace about it. I am comforted knowing that when I get to heaven she will be there to greet me.


We never got a chance to really know you because you were taken much too soon. We can't believe it's been a year since we held you in our arms and kissed your tiny head.





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### **Learning to Let Go**

The bond between parent and child is very deep. The bond between mother and baby is especially deep. When death causes this physical and emotional bond to break, parents are faced with the difficult task of letting go. Letting go is an emotional challenge that wrenches the heart when one first considers the need to let go.

Letting go is a process; for some it's a continual process for years, saying goodbye to one aspect of the relationship and then another. For others, the parent hangs on to everything tightly all along, then lets go either all at once or gradually over a short time period. Because our personalities all differ, your process will be unique to your situation.

Letting go does not mean we erase all the memories and love of our child. Letting go is simply releasing our yearning and pain.

"But how could I let go of my precious baby?! That would be like betraying them!"

Letting go may seem like a betrayal, but it's not. It's simply choosing to release our preoccupation with our deceased baby, which allows us to concentrate less on their loss and more on the good memories so we can devote more of ourselves to the ones around us. Releasing them permits us to say "yes" to life. Our child would not want us to be continually focused upon him or her to the point we miss out on the everyday joys around us. We take only one day at a time, but after releasing them the future looks less bleak.

There is no set time to let go of your baby after his or her death. Some are able to let go months after the funeral; others require much more time. Complications to the grieving process such as court cases, a violent death, multiple losses, not having worked through previous loss, not knowing the circumstances of death, not viewing the body, moving, having another pregnancy before you've had time to heal much, compulsive behaviors and many other factors may have the bereaved family concentrating on other things during the first year rather than working through their grief, so saying good-bye often occurs much later for those with complications to their grief experience.

Many find that letting go or saying good-bye is not only an emotional release, but a spiritual release as well. God already is taking care of their child, but it's a time when the bereaved let go and give Him the custody of their child, which He already has.



### My Shattered Dream

On November 11, 1999, I found out I was pregnant with my second child. I already had a little boy, so now I dreamed of a little girl. Thirty minutes after I found out I was pregnant I found out it was twins. Yes, I was having two. I was all alone at the doctor's office and very scared. At that same visit they told me they saw no separation in the babies' sacs. I had no idea what that meant. I rushed to tell my husband, who was even more excited than I was. He hoped it would be two girls. The doctor sent me to a specialist who agreed I had monoamniotic twins, a new term for me, but something I now understand. The same ultrasound also revealed our dream of two identical girls. We guickly named them Katlynn and Kaylena. But on our next ultrasound the dream would be shattered. The nurse quickly scanned me and said the words I will never forget: "One of the babies has passed away." I died at that moment. I had to go on for Kaylena, even though I lost Katlynn. I was so concerned. Would I deliver? Would she make it? I had to go until 32-34 weeks for a good chance. And on March 3, 2000, I delivered my girls, one silent and one healthy. Now I have an 11-month-old little girl who is at times all alone. I truly cannot express the pain of losing one of my girls, and I can't imagine not having the other one!!! ### News About Neural-Tube Defects

According to the *New England Journal of Medicine* (Dec. 24, 1992), the risk of recurrent neural-tube defects is decreased in women who take folic acid or multivitamins containing such during the time period before conception. In clinical trials, women who took a vitamin supplement containing 0.8 mg. of folic acid daily before conception gave birth to children with a significantly lower rate of neural-tube defects than women who only took trace elements of folic acid.

Jesus as they let go. Others release a balloon at a special location. You might want to be alone, or you may want someone special to be with you as you release your child. Many have written a letter to the one they are releasing. Some make a list of things they miss or will miss doing with the child, then release each aspect of their relationship and the things on the list. Many have found it is convenient to use prayer for letting go. They simply tell Jesus the pain, anger and every emotion they feel, letting the tears flow. You may find it helpful to picture your child with Jesus and express the things to Jesus that you wish you could say to your child. Then make the choice to release your child to their Heavenly Father who loves them even more than you do.

Each one of us had a very special, unique relationship with our baby, so our letting go process will be as uniquely individual as that relationship.

One thing to remember: **letting go doesn't mean you let go of the memories.** Once you do let go of your child, you discover the sweet memories increase. **Letting go does release the pain, however.** The memories stay; the pain fades.

Letting go may be the most difficult challenge you encounter in your grief, but the peace which follows is incomparable.

Letting go is a significant step in the healing process. When we're able to let go of our child, we're taking a giant step towards recovery. We will remain forever changed, but not forever sad.
