Moving to a New Home After a Loss

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Within moments of discovering our baby Jonathan no longer had a heartbeat, I realized Byron and I were going to have to make some major decisions regarding a funeral and what to do with Jonathan's lifeless little body once he was delivered. We chose to have a graveside service and bury him next to my grandparents at a cemetery where my mother's family had one small plot available. Even though I realize he is not really *there*, just knowing he is next to my grandmother for some reason has always been very comforting to me.

It wasn't until I started M. □ N. □ that I discovered the anguish some parents go through when given their options of what to do with their little one's body. Each state has its own law regarding when parents who have a fetal demise are given a death certificate and are ordered to make arrangements for their baby. In Texas the law sets this standard at 20 weeks gestation or a baby weighing more than 500 grams. It seems overwhelming to not only be given the news that your child has died, but then be forced to make decisions that no parent ought to have to make. Parents are first given the option of cremation or burial. Then if the parents prefer to cremate, they must choose to either bury the cremation remains, scatter the ashes at some meaningful location, or keep them in a special place in their home.

A major factor in finalizing the plans is considering the possibility of not always living in the same city, state, or country where the baby died. Deciding what to do with Jonathan was hard emotionally, but really the decision was not all that difficult for us to make.

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With my family's roots in the Dallas/Fort Worth metroplex, no matter where Byron and I may live someday there will always be family around to care for my son's grave. Thankfully we have no intention of ever leaving the area and Byron's occupation will never force us to move. But I have several friends from M.E.N.D. who have had to painfully move away from where they buried their baby. Again, although we are confident that our babies are in Heaven and only their "shells" are in the ground, it is still very difficult to leave the places where we laid their bodies to rest.

We live in the same house we lived in when Jonathan was stillborn nearly seven years ago, and not long after his death some friends of ours thoughtfully planted a miniature magnolia tree in our front yard in his memory. I told Byron at the time to be prepared, for when we move someday the tree will be going with us – no matter how much it may cost. I cannot imagine moving to a different home and leaving the tree behind and depending on another family to take care of it, not to mention the fact that they would not have the sentimental ties to it that we do. For now Byron appears to agree with me, but only time will tell if he'll stick to his opinion if the idea of transferring the tree to a different yard becomes a reality.

There are a few other families I know from M.E.N.D. whose babies died at a few weeks or months old. Unlike those of us who never took our babies home, these families experienced their children sleeping in the nursery, eating in the kitchen, bathing in the bathtub and perhaps crawling and exploring every square inch of the house. The homes hold many memories of the baby for these families. While some parents find that returning and continuing to live in the same place is entirely too painful and move away very quickly, others feel as though their homes are a monument of sorts to their baby and think they can never leave.

Making decisions about what to do with our babies after death, then later relocating to different areas are choices each of us must make on our own. There is no right and there is no wrong – everyone must decide to do what works best for them. No matter what we choose regarding these issues, the apostle Paul comforts us in 2 Corinthians 5:1 by reminding us that "...if the earthly tent we live in is destroyed, we have a building from God, an eternal house in Heaven, not built by human hands." It is nice to know that no matter where Jonathan's little earthly body is (and our baby we miscarried this past December) or where Byron and I ever live, they are in Heaven dwelling in a home that was built for them by our Heavenly Father.

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Moving After Loss

Many bereaved parents find that moving is quite a challenge after the loss of their child. Most counselors advise one to not make any major changes such as career changes or move to a new residence during the first year after a loss, but sometimes that is unavoidable. Others make major changes to hopefully rid themselves of pain, only to discover that usually the loss of the home where the baby was with them adds another loss to their healing process.

When one moves to another home or to a new job after losing a child, the new people don't know about the child who died, so bereaved parents often feel overwhelmed trying to explain to people who probably don't want to really know, yet in your heart you feel the *need* to share about the missing child. New people may shy away from you at a time when you need support, simply because grief isn't something they feel comfortable with. Those who may have cherished memories of your baby tend to lose them more quickly once you are not in as frequent contact with them, too.

Many have moved soon after loss only to discover the move complicates the healing process as one can't return to her old home again. Things will never be the same, so the move adds another loss on top of your major loss.

Another complication of moving after losing a baby is finding a new doctor. If you move before enough healing has occurred, it may seem too overwhelming to tell a new doctor or midwife *all* your history, but it is very important they know it during any subsequent pregnancy. When you have not yet healed very much, just trying to locate a doctor or midwife may seem overwhelming. It also is important to return, if possible, to the place where your baby died before you enter a subsequent pregnancy so all these memories don't come rushing in on you when you are in labor. If you cannot return to the place you delivered your baby or where he or she died, try to visit the maternity ward or ER of the local hospital before you conceive again or at least before delivery. This will help prevent all these emotions of your loss from crashing down on you during the birth of a new child.

The following are the replies from a few bereaved moms who I asked to share briefly about their moves:

"We have all of Gabby's things stored away in the new garage, up above all the tools and sawdust. Seems so wrong to not have her here with us. She would've loved this big house and having the field next door to run around in." *Gabby's mom*

"I think I remember reading in one of the infant loss books that a great percentage of bereaved parents [of infant loss] move soon after their loss. I don't know the percentage. I also wonder if people move to 'start over' because the pain of their loss is too great where all the memories are.

"It was sad to leave behind the nursery that was supposed to be Mary Beth's. I have a tradition as I move, that I always say good-bye to each room in the house. 'Good-bye, kitchen.' 'Good-bye, living room.' 'Good-bye bedroom.' I remember lingering in Mary Beth's nursery. I swallowed hard, and said, 'Good-bye, Mary Beth.'

"I think it is AWESOME that our Lord is omniscient and omnipresent. He goes before us, He goes with us. EVEN WHEN WE MOVE. 'You both precede and follow me, and place Your hand of blessing on my head. This is too glorious, too wonderful to believe! I can never be lost to your Spirit! I can never get away from my God! If I go up to heaven, You are there; if I go down to the place of the dead, You are there. If I ride the morning winds to the farthest oceans, even there Your hand will guide me, Your strength will support me' (Psalm 139:5-10, *The Living Bible*).

"I think that Psalm is too wonderful and powerful to comprehend. How God can both precede and follow me!!! What a wonderful, wonderful God!!!" Mary Beth's mom

"I'm not sure if it is the moving as much as it is 'first time' things for me. Just seeing my husband walking in our new yard near the creek all by himself, I could just 'see' a little boy walking with his daddy. I was sad to think about how much fun a little boy and a creek could have together! But my girls enjoy it too. I think all the major things that happen to our family make me think about how Joseph isn't here to partake." *Joseph's mom*

"We enjoyed our trip back to Illinois very much and also to Ohio where my family is from. We stayed the first five days at my sister's house. I liked being that close to the cemetery where Esther 'sleeps.' We walked down and lit a candle a couple of times. I noticed that I thought of her even *more* than usual and with *more* emotion while in Illinois. I think it's because since we've moved to Oregon, there aren't as many associations connected with her as in Illinois. Once again the emotions hit unexpectedly!" *Esther's mom*

I especially like what Mary Beth's mom shared, that God goes before and behind us. He cares about our pain and loss and our moves.

Taking Traditions With You

Since we lost Chrissie so early in the pregnancy, we have few mementoes and were unable to bury our child. The feeling we were left with was like having a big Christmas present, opening it, and finding out there was nothing left inside. Just like that, she was here and then she was gone.

Chrissie's name was chosen for the meaning of the flower Chrysanthemum – light of HOPE in dark times. Lynn and I had struggled for over three years to have a baby and she brought so much hope to us that our dream of starting a family was about to come true.

At the time Chrissie left us, we lived in an apartment with a small pond just outside our door. On special occasions or when we needed to feel close to our child, we would release chrysanthemums into the pond and watch them float away just as she had floated in and out of our arms. We have moved once since our loss but have been able to release chrysanthemums into new ponds, and we have created precious little tokens of remembrance to remind us daily of what Chrissie means to us. God gives us peace with this tradition and tells us that Chrissie will always live on in our hearts no matter where we live.

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



vironmental Study Suggests Water Puts Pregnancies at Risk

According to a study released by two environmental groups in January, Texas' tap water could put pregnancies at risk for miscarriage, neural tube defects, and reduced fetal growth.

The Environmental Working Group and the Public Interest Research Group identified several Texas cities that may have increased health risks to unborn babies. The culprits of this health hazard are runoff from urban sprawl and agricultural sites, combined with chlorine. When these get together, illness-causing compounds such as chloroform can result.

The report states that 26,525 Texas pregnancies are at increased risk each year for miscarriage and birth defects. The cities with the highest tested contamination include Garland, Mesquite, Plano, Richardson, Laredo, Amarillo, and Texarkana. According to Jane Houlihan, EWG's research director, small towns have twice the risk of having byproducts in their drinking water.

Houlihan advises that simple steps such as using a water filter or drinking bottled water can reduce exposure to potential risks.

One environmental health expert cautioned that the link between byproducts and risk of miscarriage and birth defects was suggestive, but not conclusive. He stated that people should be aware of the high levels of contamination, nonetheless.

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"Not only so, but we also rejoice in our sufferings, because we know that suffering produces perseverance; perseverance, character; and character, hope. And hope does not disappoint us, because God has poured out his love into our hearts by the Holy Spirit, whom he has given us." Romans 5:3-5

Shortly after moving from Texas to California, I found myself in a slump. I left choir practice one night, and though the people there were nice, I still hadn't really connected with anyone in particular since moving to that church. As I drove back home across the lonely desert, I felt isolated. I missed music practice at my old church, when I would prepare to leave but would hang around the parking lot and talk to good friends for a while. I missed having people ask how I was doing, telling me they still hurt for me, offering shoulders and ears when I needed them. I missed being around people who "knew" Joseph and had been through the experience of losing him with me. There was no one yet at my new church who felt comfortable talking about him with me. I was hopeful about a couple of ladies, but we still hadn't developed the kind of friendships I longed for.

I cried on that drive across the dark night as I fought the loneliness, and I cried the next day when I found out a college friend had lost her baby. I cried again when I found out that a M.E.N.D. member had to let her baby go at 24 weeks gestation - exactly one year since her first daughter was stillborn. I felt myself getting more and more on edge as Joseph's second birthday approached that weekend. It all seemed so wrong, so unfair. It made me want to say, "God, what are you thinking?"

You know, I'm sure the disciples asked that question, too, as they watched Jesus hang on the cross. It was a horrible thing, a terrible event, and there seemed to be no sense in it at all. Yet, the most awful moment in history also turned out to be the most wonderful. Jesus' brutal, cruel death was the event that saved the world. However, the people standing in the shadow of the cross that day couldn't see that. They could only see an innocent man enduring excruciating pain.

That's the problem with suffering. We can't see it from God's point of view. God knows there's a plan in the pain. Down here in the middle of it, we miss His perspective, the one that sees past the suffering to the benefits. Perseverance, character, and hope just don't seem to be worth it when your arms are aching from emptiness. You'd rather be holding your baby, not struggling to build character. However, we're down here in the shadows. We can't see what's ahead. God can. He's decided it's worth it for us to endure this now, because it means better things down the road. We're talking about someone who loves us enough to let His Son die for us. He isn't just seeing how much we can handle. He loves us too much to toy with us. No, the One who loves us more than any other is looking ahead and sees something worth the pain. He's allowing us to endure this so that one day we can see the prize, too.

It seems awful now, and I'll admit that "why" is a pretty frequent question I ask God, but He sees the good stuff ahead. He has the vision, so He's the one to follow. Hang on through the trials. Go where He's going. He knows the path to where it's worth it all.

There, you won't be disappointed.
