Miscarriage/Ectopic Pregnancies

"A person is a person no matter how small." - Dr. Seuss

"A loss is a loss, is a loss." This is a phrase I have repeated numerous times in the support groups I facilitate. I began using this mantra within the first few months of directing MEND, when a mom alluded during discussion that her loss, a stillbirth, was more significant than those who had lost their babies early in their pregnancies. Admittedly, though, as those words came out of my mouth month after month, I secretly questioned myself, "Rebekah, do you *really* mean that?"

When I began M.E.N.D. in 1996, I had only experienced the loss of my son Jonathan, who was born still because of a cord accident. Six years later I endured a miscarriage ten weeks into my third pregnancy. My visit to radiology at the hospital the day before my scheduled D&C for an additional sonogram opened my eyes to how very different a miscarriage is viewed versus a later loss.

My husband, Byron, and I arrived at the outpatient center to have the death of our tiny baby confirmed. I was extremely emotional, and the technician could clearly see how upset I was. Instead of sympathetically and quietly performing the procedure, he struck up a conversation with my husband while manipulating the sonogram probe inside my body, as if we were merely there for the fun of it. He asked Byron where his dental practice was located and where he enjoyed eating lunch every day. With tears streaming down my face, I glanced at the screen and once again saw my little lifeless baby. The tech, hardly saying a word to me, then picked up a phone and jovially requested that a radiologist come to the room to "confirm a fetal demise." The doctor came in, looked at the screen,

wrote something on my chart, then left. Never did he acknowledge my presence.

If there was anything positive to take away from that experience, it was that I could now relate to other families who endured a loss that society tends to minimize very much. As mothers, we fall in love with our babies the minute conception is confirmed, and sometimes even before if the pregnancy was planned in advance. However, when those dreams are crushed in a single second, we are expected to suck it up, move on, and "try again." Additionally, we are quoted statistics suggesting that most women experience a miscarriage, usually without their knowledge. I guess that is supposed to make us feel better.

Having experienced a stillbirth and a miscarriage, I have to admit that yes, the circumstances surrounding the two types of losses are very different. However, the outcome is exactly the same: a baby died. My second common phrase I say at our support groups and when speaking to medical professionals is, "A baby is a baby, is a baby,"

If the loss of your baby happened early in the pregnancy, you may think it is less significant than if you had suffered a stillbirth or neonatal death. Maybe you even feel silly for mourning a baby that you do not even know was a boy or girl. Perhaps you have been mentally begging people, *someone, anyone,* to affirm your sadness. Well here's your validation: a loss is a loss and a baby is a baby. And yes, I *really* do mean that.

Option Given to Costly Drug for Pregnancy

WASHINGTON, *March 31, 2011*—The Food and Drug Administration took the unusual step Wednesday of inviting pharmacies to make a legal end run around a St. Louis company that obtained agency approval for a pregnancy drug and promptly raised the price from \$20 per dose to \$1,500.

The drug, a synthetic form of progesterone trade-named Makena, is recommended for women at high risk of delivering prematurely. And the price increase by K-V Pharmaceutical Co. ignited a firestorm of objections from patients, political leaders and medical organizations.

Now the FDA has declared it will not take enforcement action against pharmacies that fill prescriptions for the drug by compounding their own versions instead of using the version marketed by K-V.

The problem arises from an unusual situation. Until early this year, women obtained the drug from so-called compounding pharmacies that produced it on a made-to-order basis.

Although custom-made for each patient, it had been priced at only about \$20 per dose.

Then in February, K-V was granted exclusive rights for seven years to make Makena, ending, at least in theory, the need for made-to-order versions.

But the company's pricing announcement, coupled with letters that K-V sent to pharmacies warning them of possible FDA enforcement action if they kept compounding the drug, aroused a strong pushback from several members of Congress, including Sens. Sherrod Brown, D-Ohio, and Amy Klobuchar, D-Minn., as well as from patients and obstetrical and pediatric groups.

Responding to the public and political pressure, the FDA said it had no intention of blocking pharmacies from selling their own versions of Makena.

"In order to support access to this important drug, at this time and under this unique situation, FDA does not intend to take enforcement action against pharmacies that compound [Makena] based on a valid prescription," the statement said.

In a statement after the FDA's announcement, K-V said it would do more to make the drug affordable, though it did not say it would lower the price.

Makena is administered in weekly injections, usually beginning at 16 to 18 weeks into a pregnancy and continuing until 36 weeks.

K-V's pricing increased the cost of the drug to \$30,000 from about \$400 for that period.

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A Hard Lesson Learned

In 2003, I became the "pregnancy trailblazer" among my friends. Pregnant with my first child, I knew my risk for miscarriage was high, so I read a lot of books and did a lot of web-surfing, researching every little ache and pain. I was extremely fearful when I experienced spotting from weeks 6 to 13. At week 14, I breathed a sigh of relief. I was through my first trimester. My bleeding had stopped. I thought I was free and clear. Sadly, my first pregnancy resulted in the stillbirth of my son, David. After his death, I became much more aware of the issue of pregnancy loss and the pain and heartache that it brings.

In total, my husband, Rob, and I have suffered through more eight years of infertility. We are thankful beyond words that God blessed us with our miracle baby, C.J., in 2005, but after years of more failed fertility treatments, Rob and I decided it was time to move on with our lives. Believing it was all but impossible for me to get pregnant, we were shocked to experience three subsequent pregnancies. In 2008, my first surprise pregnancy nearly killed me. Never guessing I could be pregnant, I went through my entire first trimester with my precious baby growing in my fallopian tube. My doctor saved my life, but my tube ruptured. Seven months after that loss, I experienced a miscarriage. Again, the pregnancy was a surprise, and we never learned how far along I was. Thirteen months later, we lost our last baby to another ectopic pregnancy. This little life was detected early, but my second tube was lost to the pregnancy and endometriosis.

I am ashamed to admit it now, but until recent years, I did not really consider ectopic pregnancies to be "real" pregnancies. I was sensitive to the pain and heartache that a miscarriage could bring. And during those early months of my first pregnancy, I had read about ectopic pregnancies. Everything I read, though, was so focused on the medical dangers for the mother, I do not think I fully understood that those pregnancies represented the real life of a baby and the hopes and joys of that baby's family just like any other pregnancy.

Years ago, in those first weeks after David's stillbirth. a well-meaning family member commented to me, "Why couldn't you have just miscarried?" The statement jarred me. "Just miscarried?" I was taken aback, not only because I had seen first-hand through other M.E.N.D. members the suffering that a miscarriage brings, but I was also horrified by the thought of losing my David sooner than I had. Was this person trying to say that I would have been better off if I had never seen his precious heartbeat? Better off never knowing the joys of shopping for maternity clothes and taking pictures of my swelling belly? Better off not given the chance to discuss baby names? Better off not knowing of the miracle of feeling him move inside of me, finding out our firstborn would be a boy, buying those first baby gifts? Consider the case of a mother who has buried her teenage daughter. Would it ever cross a person's mind to ask, "Why couldn't she just have died as a baby?" Heavens, no! The loss of a child at any age is tragic, and we should rejoice in every moment we are given with our children. As the mother of a five year old, I treasure every single day my son is in my life. Why should the days we carry our babies inside of us be considered any different?

Of course, I understand what that particular family member was trying to say. She felt that the pain I was experiencing would be somehow lesser had I lost my son earlier in my pregnancy. And I would be lying if I said the sorrow I felt with my early pregnancy losses was as intense as the grief I experienced when David died six months into my pregnancy. However, I could simply never wish away a single day that I had with him. Feeling him grow and move inside of me is still one of the most treasured experiences of my life. My grief for my last three babies was different, yes. But part of my grief is that I never heard their beautiful heartbeats. I never got to feel them move inside of me. I never even got to know if they were boys or girls. I never got to hold them in my arms. I have no pictures. I have no grave to visit. I grieve that I

Abortos involuntarios y embarazos ectópicos

"Una pérdida es una perdida, es una perdida, es una perdida" Esta es la frase que yo siempre repetía numerosas veces en los grupos de apoyo en los cuales yo he participado, yo he usado esta mantra desde los primeros meses cuando empecé a dirigir MEND, cuando de repente una madre aludió durante una discusión acerca de su perdida, una muerte fetal, diciendo que está perdida es más significativa que para aquellos que habían perdido a sus bebes en una etapa temprana de sus embarazos, sin embargo mientras yo repetía esas palabras mes tras mes, me preguntaba a mi misma: Rebekah, crees realmente en lo que estas diciendo???

Cuando empecé a trabajar en M.E.N.D. en 1996, sólo tenía la experiencia de la pérdida de mi hijo Jonathan, que nació aún mortinato debido a un accidente con el cordón umbilical, seis años después tuve un aborto involuntario a las diez semanas de mi tercer embarazo. Pero mi visita a la oficina de radiología para otro sonograma en el hospital, el día antes de mi legrado programado, abrió mis ojos sobre la manera diferente, en como se observa un aborto involuntario temprano en el embarazo, en comparación a una perdida más tarde durante el mismo.

Mi esposo, Byron y yo, llegamos al hospital para que nos confirmaran la muerte de nuestro pequeño bebe. Yo estaba extremadamente mal y el técnico se pudo dar cuenta de mi estado. A pesar de esto en vez de estar callado y haciendo el procedimiento de una manera tranquila, el empezó a tener una conversación con mi esposo mientras manipulaba la sonda ecográfica dentro de mi cuerpo, como si estuviéramos ahí simplemente por diversión, el continuo su conversación preguntándole a Byron donde estaba su clínica dental y donde almorzaba todos los días..........con lagrimas cayendo sobre mi cara, mire la pantalla viendo por última vez a mi bebe ya sin vida dentro de mi vientre, el técnico casi sin decirme ni una sola palabra, levanto el teléfono llamando a un radiólogo para que llegara al cuarto a "confirmar una muerte fetal": El doctor entro, miro la pantalla y

escribió algo en mi ficha y se marcho. Tristemente nunca se percato de mi presencia.

Si hubiera algo positivo que sacar de esta experiencia, seria que ahora puedo relacionarme y puedo entender a otras familias que han sufrido una pérdida de esta naturaleza, que la sociedad tiende a minimizar bastante. Como madres, nos enamoramos de nuestros bebes desde el momento en que nos confirman la concepción y a veces incluso antes si el embarazo fue planeado con anticipación. Entonces cuando los sueños son derrumbados en un solo segundo, se espera que nosotros lo entendamos, sigamos adelante e 'intentemos quedar embarazadas otra vez. Además, nos dicen las estadísticas que la mayoría de las mujeres que experimentan un aborto, generalmente no se dan cuenta. Supongo que creen que esa información nos debe hacer sentir mejor.

Después de haber experimentado un embarazo mortinato y un aborto involuntario, tengo que admitir que, sí, las dos circunstancias de las pérdidas son muy diferentes. Sin embargo, el resultado es exactamente el mismo: un bebé murió. Mi segunda frase común que repito en nuestros grupos de apoyo y cuando doy platicas a profesionales médicos es, "un bebé es un bebé, es un bebé, es un bebé".

Si la pérdida de su bebé ocurrió temprano en el embarazo, usted pensara que es menos significativa que si usted hubiera sufrido un aborto o muerte neonatal. Tal vez se sienta rara lamentando a un bebé que no sabía aún si era un niño o niña. Quizás usted mentalmente ha estado pidiéndole a la gente, alguna persona, cualquier persona, que afirme y comparta su tristeza. Pues bien aquí está su confirmación: una pérdida es una pérdida y un bebé es un bebé. Y desde lo más profundo de mi corazón se lo digo sinceramente hoy.

did not get to know them in the way that I knew David. The grief is different, but it is no less real than the babies themselves were real.

In my first five years of involvement with M.E.N.D., I often lamented that I couldn't fully relate to the women who were there grieving early pregnancy loss. I wondered if they thought I was fit to speak comfort and truth into their lives. I feared that they may not know that I valued their babies' lives and their grief as much as I valued my own. Little did I know what my future held. Had I known I would lose three more babies, the thought

would have been unbearable. Is this the path I would have chosen for myself? Certainly not! But as I share my journey with others, I am so pleased that God has seen fit to expand His ministry through me. I am so thankful that He can use me more fully in the lives of families who have experienced early loss through miscarriage or ectopic pregnancy. He is a good God. I am blessed to be a tool in His hands. And His grace is sufficient.



never got to hold because of a miscarriage. I remember the who lets all our silent moments in the middle of the night when I would wake up to stare at the ceiling and ask God, "Why?"

There is something within us that wants to know

the reason. It seems as if understanding could somehow lessen the pain. I was part of a grief support group, and I remember the facilitator asking everyone in the room, "Do you want to know why?" Every hand was raised. Then she asked, "Would it make the hurt go away?" We all slowly shook our heads as we realized that the answers we sought wouldn't necessarily bring the healing we needed.

In A Grief Observed, C.S. Lewis writes about the loss of his wife. Throughout the book he wrestles with his faith. Toward the end he writes, "When I lay these questions before God, I get no answer. But a rather special sort of 'No answer.' It is not the locked door. It is more like a silent, certainly not uncompassionate, gaze. As though He shook His head not in refusal but waiving the question. Like, I pushed my 'Peace, child; you don't understand.'" baby through

As much as we want to know, there are many things on this side of eternity that we will never understand. As a member of a book-reading club, I once read a book about the Holocaust. At one point our discussion turned to why God would allow such horrors. At the time I had recently lost my baby, and it felt as if a small holocaust had happened in my heart as well. I remember saying,

"I don't know, but I feel as if God is asking me, 'Will you love Me for who you want Me to be or for who I am?"

I don't know about you, but I want a God who doesn't allow suffering. I want a God who lets all our dreams come true, who erases death, who heals all my hurts, and who does it now. But that's not the God we Somehow we have to release those expectations and decide that, despite it all, He is good, He loves us, and we love Him.

One of my heroes, Angie Smith, wrote in her blog, Bring the Rain, about the loss of her daughter Audrey Caroline and compared it to Moses' mother releasing her son in a basket onto the river:

> Sometimes I think it's harder to believe the way I do, because I believe with everything in me that He could have changed the story. This line of thinking inevitably brings me to the question, "Why didn't He?" Many people have written me with the same question, and I want to tell you that I have thought it through many times, and I have come up with a great theological explanation I want to share with you.

> > I have absolutely no idea. What I do know is this:

The Lord walks beside me as He walked beside Moses, and He knows me by name. He loves me, and I love Him. I pushed my baby through the reeds and never saw her again. And yet here I am, worshipping the God who allowed it

At some point, we all come to the place where we're asked to open our hands, release our questions,

and embrace the One whose ways we do not understand but whose heart we know. And the moment we can finally trade our "why" for a "Who," the rest of our journey changes.


