Mommies Enduring Neonatal Death

Generational Grief

My son Jonathan was stillborn in 1995 - a time when I feel the protocol for pregnancy and infant loss was just beginning to make a turn toward more parental and family involvement. I happened to be in the hospital on bed rest when my baby became entangled in his umbilical cord and died. An acquaintance who providentially worked as a labor and delivery nurse at the Dallas hospital where I was a patient gently informed me before my C-section that I should hold Jonathan after he was born and allow all my family members and friends to meet and hold him as well. And, in fact, I could have him as long as I wanted - even keep him in my room overnight.

We chose not to keep Jonathan in my room overnight, but we did have him in my recovery room for a few hours the night he was delivered, all day the next day, and for a short time the third day until the funeral home came to get him. We loved on him and took numerous pictures and video of him. Everyone who came to the hospital to express their condolences was given the opportunity to hold our sweet little baby. All of this, I thought was "normal"; it was what everyone did following the death of their baby.

However, several months later, I found out through a handful of hospital personnel that, at that time, having Jonathan with us for three days was actually not considered normal at all. Several of the older nurses were horrified and felt we were not accepting the reality that our baby was dead. Eventually the chaplain of the large hospital scheduled meetings with those who cared for us to discuss their feelings and thoughts regarding whether they felt our unusual way of responding to our baby's death was helpful and healing or hurtful. The consensus was that it was a very healthy way of dealing with infant death. They were not used to this but felt it was good, nevertheless.

I've been told that because the staff saw how meaningful it was for our family to spend so much time with our baby, the guidelines in the hospital completely changed. Now, every family (if possible) is encouraged to spend unrushed time with their baby. They are allowed to request the baby for as long as the mom is a patient in the hospital (unless an autopsy is ordered), and every family member and friend is encouraged to meet the baby as well.

Nineteen years later, a lot has changed in hospitals all over the United States. Most hospitals allow families to have the same experience my family had. It is now common for bereaved families to spend more than just an hour or two with their babies. Many hospitals will accommodate situations such as grandparents living out of town who want to see their precious little grandbaby but cannot get to the hospital for maybe another day or two. Rarely are parents denied photographs and/or discouraged from taking their own pictures.

What is now "normal" to this generation of young parents remains "un-natural" to those of another generation. Not that long ago, stillborn babies where whisked out of the delivery room. The mom was not even told if she had a boy or girl, and the idea of holding the baby would have been appalling. Certainly, it was taboo to ever speak of "it" again. Additionally, moms were told not to waste the chosen name, so the little one was thus stripped of being called anything. The aftermath of these old ways resulted in deeply repressed grief. Young mothers grieved silently, not daring to pour their hearts out to a soul lest they be labeled as unstable and weak.

Today, with the freedom that infant loss groups such as M.E.N.D. have made available, some of these moms who are now in their 50s and older are slowly starting to openly grieve and share their experiences. Older women commonly attend our support groups, talk about their babies for the first time, and participate in our remembrance ceremonies.

I truly cannot imagine going through life feeling like I am not allowed to talk about my Jonathan and my little

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The Heart of the Leader

I ALWAYS wanted three children. I was one of three. My mom and dad were both one of three. We already had a 4-year-old little girl, Avery, and a 2-year-old boy, Tate, but this time taking that leap of faith to have a baby was much harder. Tate was diagnosed with an extremely rare immune/blood disorder called Wiskott-Aldrich Syndrome (WAS) at 4 months old. Without a bone marrow transplant, he had a 30 percent chance to live to his first birthday. We were devastated, but *God had bigger plans*. Avery was a perfect match for her brother. Tate was successfully transplanted at 6 months old. The road wasn't easy, but by 2 and a half years old, he was a healthy, happy and rambunctious little boy.

Once we were back into a "normal" life, I started feeling the tugging on my heart for baby number three. Although hesitant, my husband agreed to try again after we went through genetic counseling. I became pregnant right away. We



were so excited, especially with an almost zero chance of having another baby with WAS. It never occurred to me that the baby could die inside of me. At eight weeks, I thought I had a really bad stomach bug, but on Memorial Day weekend 2002, I miscarried at 10 weeks. My heart and my dreams were broken. Even though my family was so supportive and loving, they couldn't make this better. This wasn't how it was supposed to happen. After all we had been through with Tate, how could God let this happen? Again, *God had bigger plans*.

This time it took much more convincing and prayer to get my husband to try for another baby. There are some burdens a husband just cannot bear for his wife. He didn't know if he could do it again, or worse, watch me go through it again. Prayerfully, we decided to try again. Once again, I became pregnant right away with TWINS. Talk about bigger plans. After the shock wore off, excitement and planning took over. Everything was normal until our 20-week appointment. We found out two alarming things: they were identical boys, and they were showing signs of twin-to-twin transfusion.

WAS only affects boys. Even though genetic counseling gave little cause for concern, the "what-ifs" definitely played over and over in our heads. The

baby I miscarried. They are just as much my children as my living son. I want to talk about them; I NEED to talk about them, even after so many years. Let's keep making efforts to move forward in openly grieving and acknowledging our little ones who are not with us. If you feel your family or hospital is still adhering to the older ways of grieving pregnancy and infant loss, I encourage you to be the one to step up and educate them. Teach those who disagree with open grief that many studies prove talking about the loss is much healthier than suppressing one's feelings and emotions. Explain that your baby has a purpose and is real, and in doing so, you will make sure your baby is always talked about and never forgotten.

Increase of Rare Birth Defects in Washington State Has Experts Stumped

A rare birth defect is on the rise in Washington State, and the bizarre trend has health officials stumped.

The odd development was brought to light in 2012 by Sara Barron, who was working as a nurse at Prosser Medical Hospital in rural Washington at the time.

That year, Barron encountered two cases of babies born with anencephaly - a neural tube birth defect that causes infants to be born without certain areas of the brain and skull. A devastating condition that affects only one or two babies out of every 10,000 pregnancies, anencephaly occurs when the upper part of the neural tube doesn't close all the way during the first month of pregnancy. Almost all babies born with this condition die shortly after pregnancy.

"We had this first case, and it's horrifying," Barron, now a nursing instructor at Washington State University, told FoxNews.com. "And then less than a month later, we had another mother come in and have a baby with anencephaly... and it affected the whole hospital. But I thought, two in two months with a hospital that small – that's a lot."

Throughout her entire 30-year nursing career, Barron had only encountered this birth defect twice before. Then, when Barron heard of another case of anencephaly at a hospital 30 miles away, she decided it was time to inform the Washington State Department of Health (DOH).

"As a member of the infection control group [at Prosser], we all meet once a month at the health department with lead epidemiologists in our area," Barron said. "And I said, 'This isn't infectious per se, but I've become aware of three cases [of anencephaly] in two months. Has anyone else seen anything like this?' And another person from another tiny hospital said, 'Yeah, we just saw one.' It was way too many in this small of an area."

Barron's report eventually sparked a state DOH investigation. After looking over hospital and medical records spanning a three-county area in the state, health officials found that the birth defect was indeed increasing in the region.

According to the report, published by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), there were a total of 23 anencephaly cases in the Washington state region between January 2010 and January 2013, equating to 8.4 cases per 10,000 live births. Comparatively, throughout the country there were an average of only 2.1 anencephaly cases per 10,000 live births during the same period.

So far, state health officials do not know what is behind this localized trend. A state-led study looking into potential causes of this increase found "no common exposures, conditions, or causes." The state's department of health noted the difficulty of using medical records to figure out the problem.

"Medical record reviews might not have captured all information, preventing a cause from being identified," the Washington State Department of Health said in a press release.

While the exact cause of the Washington cases hasn't been determined, Barron said she believes the pregnancies might have something to do with the agricultural industry – since most of the mothers affected have been from rural communities.

"If I was going to have a theory, I would say there's something agricultural, like [new] pesticides or insecticides, which are known to cause neural defects," Barron

Grieving Across Generations

I remember as a child going to our small town's cemetery with my grandmother. We went to visit her parents' graves, and afterward, she let me wander among the headstones and ask as many questions as I wanted.

The babies' graves always fascinated me. I was a child myself, with younger siblings, and I wondered what it must have felt like for the big brothers and sisters who were left behind. I remember my grandmother, who had seven living children and had never experienced infant loss, telling me she could not imagine there could be a greater pain on earth than losing a child.

On the other side of the family, there had been a loss. My mom's oldest sister was a full-term stillbirth. The baby was not exactly a taboo subject, but I remember growing up not knowing much about her. There was one grainy, black and white photo of my grandmother holding a little white bundle. That was all I really knew of my aunt in heaven. She didn't even have a name, as far as I knew, so I decided I would secretly think of her as "Helen." horrible things that happen in the world we live, we don't usually embrace another's "cause" unless we ourselves have been touched by their pain and suffering. Even then, people who want to help don't always know how, especially if they haven't felt that sort of pain for themselves.

So, here's what I've learned: No matter what generation you belong to, and no matter how you choose to remember your baby or express your grief, it helps to find people who

And then, my own son Joseph was stillborn in 1999. It was a time when the Internet was new, people still used phone books, cell phones didn't have cameras and M. D. only had one chapter, which was three hours away from me. Finding support was manageable, but it still wasn't a time of easy access. God led me to friends already in my circle who had lost children. My friend Tracee had a son who died when he was a few weeks old. Linda, a lady on my college alumni email list, heard about my loss and reached out to me since she had experienced a loss several years earlier. Those two women let me grieve openly, answered my questions, and helped me more than I ever thought possible. I connected with M. D. online, drove to a couple of meetings and found more people who understood what I was going through.

And then, there was my grandfather. His wife, the lady in the grainy photo, had passed away when I was in high school, so he was the only relative I knew who had experienced the pain of losing a baby. He and I had never talked about his unnamed daughter before, but a few days after Joseph's funeral, I found myself in the front yard, talking to a man who loved me more than I could realize about our babies in heaven. It wasn't a long conversation, but it was meaningful, and it was healing for both of us. He told me he was glad things had changed so much, that I could name my baby and have a nice service for him. My grandfather shared that my aunt had been born at home, like most babies in rural Mississippi at that time, and he had never forgiven himself for not taking his wife to a hospital for the delivery. He made sure that, even if it meant going into debt, all three of his subsequent daughters were born at a hospital. He said that even though he seldom talked about

Grief is hard, and it can be lonely. Even today, the idea of losing a baby is such a painful thing to consider that most of society doesn't want to think about it. We have come a long way in supporting bereaved parents, but I don't believe these parents will ever feel as free to grieve as they probably should. I wish it weren't that way, but I think I understand why. I can't really blame society at large. Who wants to face that reality? Much like the thought of starving children in third-world countries, or child abuse, or a hundred other horrible things that happen in the world we live, we don't usually embrace another's "cause" unless we ourselves have been touched by their pain and suffering. Even then, people who want to help don't always know how, especially if they haven't felt that sort of pain for themselves.

So, here's what I've learned: No matter what generation you belong to, and no matter how you choose to remember your baby or express your grief, it helps to find people who have been through it. Even years later (especially, years later), talking about a loss with someone who understands can help. Seeing people who have survived can help you, and helping people survive can help you. Wherever you find yourself on the grief road, don't walk it alone.

On my grandfather's death bed, he spoke about how he longed to see his wife, his mother, and then he talked about his daughter. He described her perfect hands and her curly black hair, and he said he knew she was waiting for him. As my grandfather passed in and out of consciousness, my mom and aunts cried and laughed through memories of their father, and they talked about their sister in heaven who would soon see him. I found they had gotten together and given her a name themselves: Peggy Sue. We all watched that kind man pass from our existence into hers, and we mourned and rejoiced together.

That's how we are meant to get through grief – together. No matter how society addresses infant loss, and no matter how views change throughout the years, don't ever accept the notion you are to "get over" losing your baby. Find someone who understands, whether it be through M.E.N.D., family or friends. Honor your baby's life by sharing it with someone who will appreciate its significance.

My grandmother was right as she spoke in that graveyard. There is no greater pain than losing a child. But my grandfather was right, too. Those children are waiting for us. We just have to help each other live this life, with love and support and the joy that comes with understanding, until we can see our babies again.

According to the CDC, a low intake of folic acid in the first month of pregnancy can increase a woman's risk of having a baby with neural tube defects – including anencephaly.

With so much mystery surrounding these anencephaly cases, Barron believes that more could ultimately be done to get to the root of the problem. She argued that health officials could utilize student researchers to conduct the investigation or interview mothers in the area.

"I wish they could have done more... I know the state looked at drinking water and well water, and they said there was no difference between healthy deliveries and abnormal deliveries," Barron said. "But because we didn't do any interviews with the women, we don't know for sure what water these women were drinking when they conceived. Even in medical records, we don't necessarily know how early they started taking folic acid. We don't know for sure what they were taking and when."

Don't Tell Grievers to "Move On"

As the one-year anniversary of Matthew's death approaches, I have been shocked by some subtle and not-so-subtle comments indicating that perhaps I should be ready to "move on." The soft, compassionate cocoon that has enveloped us for the last 11.5 months had lulled me into believing others would be patient with us on our grief journey, and while I'm sure many will read this and quickly say, "Take all the time you need," I'm increasingly aware that the cocoon may be in the process of collapsing. It's understandable when you take a step back. I mean, life goes on. The thousands who supported us in the aftermath of Matthew's suicide wept and mourned with us, prayed passionately for us, and sent an unbelievable volume of cards, letters, emails, texts, phone calls, and gifts. The support was utterly amazing. But for most, life never stopped – their world didn't grind to a horrific, catastrophic halt on April 5, 2013. In fact, their lives have kept moving steadily forward with tasks, routines, work, kids, leisure, plans, dreams, goals etc. LIFE GOES ON. And some of them are ready for us to go on, too. They want the old Rick and Kay back. They secretly wonder when things will get back to normal for us – when we'll be ourselves, when the tragedy of April 5, 2013, will cease to be the grid that we pass everything across. And I have to tell you – the old Rick and Kay are gone. They're never coming back. We will never be the same again. There is a new "normal." April 5, 2013, has permanently marked us. It will remain the grid we pass everything across for an indeterminate amount of time ... maybe forever.

Because these comments from well-meaning folks wounded me so deeply, I doubted myself and thought perhaps I really am not grieving "well" (whatever that means). I wondered if I was being overly sensitive - so I checked with parents who have lost children to see if my experience was unique. Far from it, I discovered. "At least you can have another child," one mother was told shortly after her child's death. "You're doing better, right?" I was asked recently. "When are you coming back to the stage at Saddleback? We need you," someone cluelessly said to me recently. "People can be so rude and insensitive; they make the most thoughtless comments," one grieving father said. You know, it wasn't all that long ago that it was standard in our culture for people to officially be in mourning for a full year. They wore black. They didn't go to parties. They didn't smile a whole lot. And everybody accepted their period of mourning; no one ridiculed a mother in black or asked her stupid questions about why she was STILL so sad. Obviously, this is no longer accepted practice; mourners are encouraged to quickly move on, turn the corner, get back to work, think of the positive, be grateful for what is left, have another baby, and other unkind, unfeeling, obtuse and downright cruel comments. What does this say about us - other than we're terribly uncomfortable with death, with grief, with mourning, with loss – or we're so self-absorbed that we easily forget the profound suffering the loss of a child creates in the shattered parents and remaining children.

Unless you've stood by the grave of your child or cradled the urn that holds their ashes, you're better off keeping your words to some very simple phrases: "I'm so sorry for your loss." Or "I'm praying for you and your family." Do your best to avoid the meaningless, catch-all phrase "How are you doing?" This question is almost impossible to answer. If you're a stranger, it's none of your business. If you're a casual acquaintance, it's excruciating to try to answer honestly, and you leave the sufferer unsure whether to lie to you (I'm ok) to end the conversation or if they should try to haltingly tell you that their right arm was cut off and they don't know how to go on without it. If you're a close friend, try telling them instead, "You don't have to say anything at all; I'm with you in this."

None of us wants to be like Job's friends – the pseudo comforters who drove him mad with their questions, their wrong conclusions and their assumptions about his grief. But too often we end up a 21st century Bildad, Eliphaz or Zophar – we fill the uncomfortable silence with words that wound rather than heal. I'm sad to realize that even now – in the middle of my own shattering loss – I can be callous with the grief of another and rush through the conversation without really listening, blithely spouting the platitudes I hate when offered to me. We're not good grievers, and when I judge you, I judge myself as well.

Here's my plea: Please don't ever tell someone to be grateful for what they have left until they've had a chance to mourn what they've lost. It will take longer than you think is reasonable, rational or even right. But that's ok. True friends – unlike Job's sorry excuse for friends – love at all times, and brothers and sisters are born to help in time of need (Prov. 17:17 LB). The truest friends and "helpers" are those who wait for the griever to emerge from the darkness that swallowed them alive without growing afraid, anxious or impatient. They don't pressure their friend to be the old familiar person they're used to; they're willing to accept that things are different, embrace the now-scarred one they love, and are confident that their compassionate, non-demanding presence is the surest expression of God's mercy to their suffering friend. They're ok with messy and slow and few answers and they never say, "Move on."

From Silence to Communicating Through Art

In 2008, when Dharma passed away, it seemed like EVERYONE came out of the woodwork and told me they had also lost a baby at some point. Most losses I heard about occurred years before, even before we had VCRs. I would feel so drawn to women who had experienced loss and ask questions. I loved it when people asked me about my daughter; I assumed these women felt the same way about their babies. I would say, "What is your baby's name? What happened? Did your baby look like you?" Every one of those woman responded with, "Oh, we don't talk about those things," or, "It was just a miscarriage" (even if the loss was at six or seven months). None of them wanted to talk about it! It really offended me that they chose to not acknowledge their children. I felt so alone. I wanted to talk about my baby, brag about my beautiful daughter and share with other moms like me. I was not able to do that until I found M.E.N.D.—Houston. I felt so drawn to these women and loved hearing all about their kids! I was in my "new" element at meetings.

At a M.E.N.D. meeting in 2009, Brandy Wilson, one of the assistant directors, showed up with a beautiful tattoo on her wrist of her daughter Laney's name. It was so classy and was such a beautiful way to have your baby with you always. I always wanted a tattoo but never knew what to get that I would not regret later, so I waited until I was sure. Otherwise, I would have ended up with a blonde Backstreet Boy's name on my shoulder! My hair dresser had suggested I get Dharma's footprint, but Dharma was born at 36 weeks and had HUGE feet! So on Dharma's third heavenly birthday, my husband and I went to the best tattoo place in town, and I had Dharma's name and a butterfly wing tattooed on my wrist. I loved it! Now she will be with me always. I didn't feel guilty not wearing my remembrance jewelry everywhere I went. Of course, I said, "This will be my one and ONLY tattoo." But it is true tattoos can be addictive!

A few years later on my friend Chiara's daughters' third heavenly birthday, she wanted to get their names tattooed, so I got one, too. It was so fun hanging out at the tattoo shop until 2:00 a.m. with a bunch of M.E.N.D. moms, talking about everything from breastfeeding to labor stories. I had "clothed with joy" (Psalm 30:11-12), a phrase from Dharma's headstone, tattooed on my right arm. It took about three years for me to finally be able to live and breathe this verse. God had removed my sackcloth and clothed me with JOY! This tattoo reminded me on the days my grief was all consuming and overwhelming that I was clothed with joy. My husband and I agreed that I would get no more, unless, God forbid, we had another loss.

Well, January 23, 2014, we lost Stella Darling. On Chiara's girls' fourth heavenly birthday, about eight of us M.E.N.D. moms went back to our tattoo shop, and I got "Stella" on my left arm, next to Dharma's name. Stormy, the Houston chapter director, had her son's name tattooed on her arm, too. While we were there, we overheard a man talking with an artist about getting a memorial tattoo for a baby, and we started talking to him about his son who was stillborn in November. We told him who we were with and had a bit of a mini-M.E.N.D. meeting with introductions and everything. We all pulled out M.E.N.D. information for him to give to his wife. After about an hour, he left nearly in tears because he thought he and his wife were the only ones this had ever happened to. He was so excited to connect with us! God even hangs out at Texas Body Art.

So comparing the way things used to be handled (not talking about it) to now (talking about it over tattoo sketches), I am forever grateful infant loss is not as taboo as it once was. I am proud of my girls and love to share their legacies with others. So when people ask about my tattoos, I gladly share my babies' stories and all God has done through them.

But here is a lesson learned: don't assume when someone has a baby foot print, hand print or angel wings around a name tattooed on them somewhere that it is a memorial tattoo. When you ask what happened to their baby, and they say nothing with a weird look ... things get awkward!

determination of WAS would have to wait until after delivery. The more immediate risk was the twin-to-twin transfusion. The difference in size and fluid level between the babies was pretty significant. Our goal was to get them to 25 weeks. Then, it was 30 weeks. Finally, after weeks of the difference growing smaller and smaller, the specialist said he didn't even need to see me anymore. We were so thankful to be able finish out this pregnancy normally. The C-section was scheduled for 38 weeks.

One week before my delivery date I went to see my regular OB. Everything looked good, but Baby B (Cooper) hadn't grown as much as expected. I went for an ultrasound on Friday afternoon of Memorial Day weekend 2003 to double check their growth. It confirmed Cooper had not grown as much, but all the other tests looked normal. We would check again early the next week.

We never made it to that appointment. After church on Sunday, I noticed I hadn't felt Cooper move since he was always REALLY ACTIVE during worship. I tried resting, eating ice cream and going for a short walk. Nothing seemed to make him move. We figured he was just cramped and tired after all the activity during church. To ease our worries, we went to the hospital. They hooked me up to the monitor and found Baby A's (Paxton's) heartbeat right away. It took a little longer to find Cooper's. We were so relieved – at least for a few moments. We came to realize the monitor was picking up the echo from Paxton's heartbeat as Cooper's. Our hearts were sinking, but still we held onto hope. How could God bring us up and down on this crazy roller coaster to end like this? After the doctor performed a sonogram, our nightmare began. Cooper had died, and we needed to get Paxton out quickly before something happened to him. I was rushed for an emergency C-section. Paxton and Cooper were delivered just after 1:00 a.m. on May 26, 2003.

After I woke and some of the haziness wore off, I realized this was not a horrible dream but a heartbreaking reality. One of my babies was in the NICU hooked up to numerous monitors and tubes and being treated for a stroke and low blood and platelet counts. The other was lying quietly in my arms. We would never hear him cry or see him smile or lay him side-by-side with his twin brother. We held and loved on Cooper for hours and hours. When the time came to say goodbye, my heart shattered into a million pieces. How was I ever going to recover from this? How could this be part of God's bigger plan?

Paxton was released from the NICU in time for his brother's funeral. The funeral was the most unreal but all-too-real situation. I remember sitting there looking at the tiny casket holding my baby. This was my reality, and it was painful. I threw myself into taking care of Paxton. Due to his medical issues, we were constantly at the doctor and hospital. Paxton did test positive for WAS and had a bone marrow transplant when he was 4 months old. Big sister was a perfect match for Paxton, also.

After about a year, Paxton was getting better. That was when the serious, gut-wrenching grief hit. All the energy I had been putting into caring for Paxton was now surfacing as postponed grief, and it hit HARD. I thought I was going crazy. My emotions were all over the place. I was so glad to have Paxton home and healthy but then completely hysterical that Cooper was not here. I did not know how I was going to get through this.

One day I got a call from a "multiples" mom about a lady coming to speak at her MOPS meeting. She thought it might be helpful to me. Desperate, I went. DaLana Barsanti told her story about the loss of her twin boys and the support she received from M.E.N.D. She was so kind and compassionate. She listened to me cry and tell my story. DaLana strongly encouraged me come to the next M.E.N.D. meeting, which was the following night. I was a little scared but badly needed to connect with others who had walked this road and made it to the other side. I realized I wasn't alone, and I wasn't going crazy. I was heartbroken over the death of my son. I also desperately wanted to know when I would be my old self. I can still see Rebekah looking me straight in the face and telling me I would never be my old self. It was not in a way that was harsh but comforting. She talked about finding my new normal. It took such pressure off of my waiting for and trying to attain something that was not going to happen. I came home and told my husband about everything that happened and how I felt completely understood. He was so glad I had found M.E.N.D. but jokingly wanted to know what I was going to do the other 29 days of the month.

With the support of Rebekah and other dear M.E.N.D. friends, I did make it through to the other side. I still miss my Cooper, and that will never change. He will forever be part of our hearts and family. I have been active in M.E.N.D. for over 10 years now. I wanted to share the comfort and compassion I received when my world fell apart. I have served as playgroup director, participated on the Walk to Remember and Christmas Ceremony committees and been part of the advisory board. I currently serve on the board of directors. Even when we do not understand God's plans, they are still bigger (and better) than our own. Jeremiah 29:11 says "For I know the plans I have for you, declares the Lord, plans for welfare and not for calamity to give you a future and a hope." I know being a part of M.E.N.D. was part of God's plan, and I am so blessed and grateful to be a part of this ministry.
